

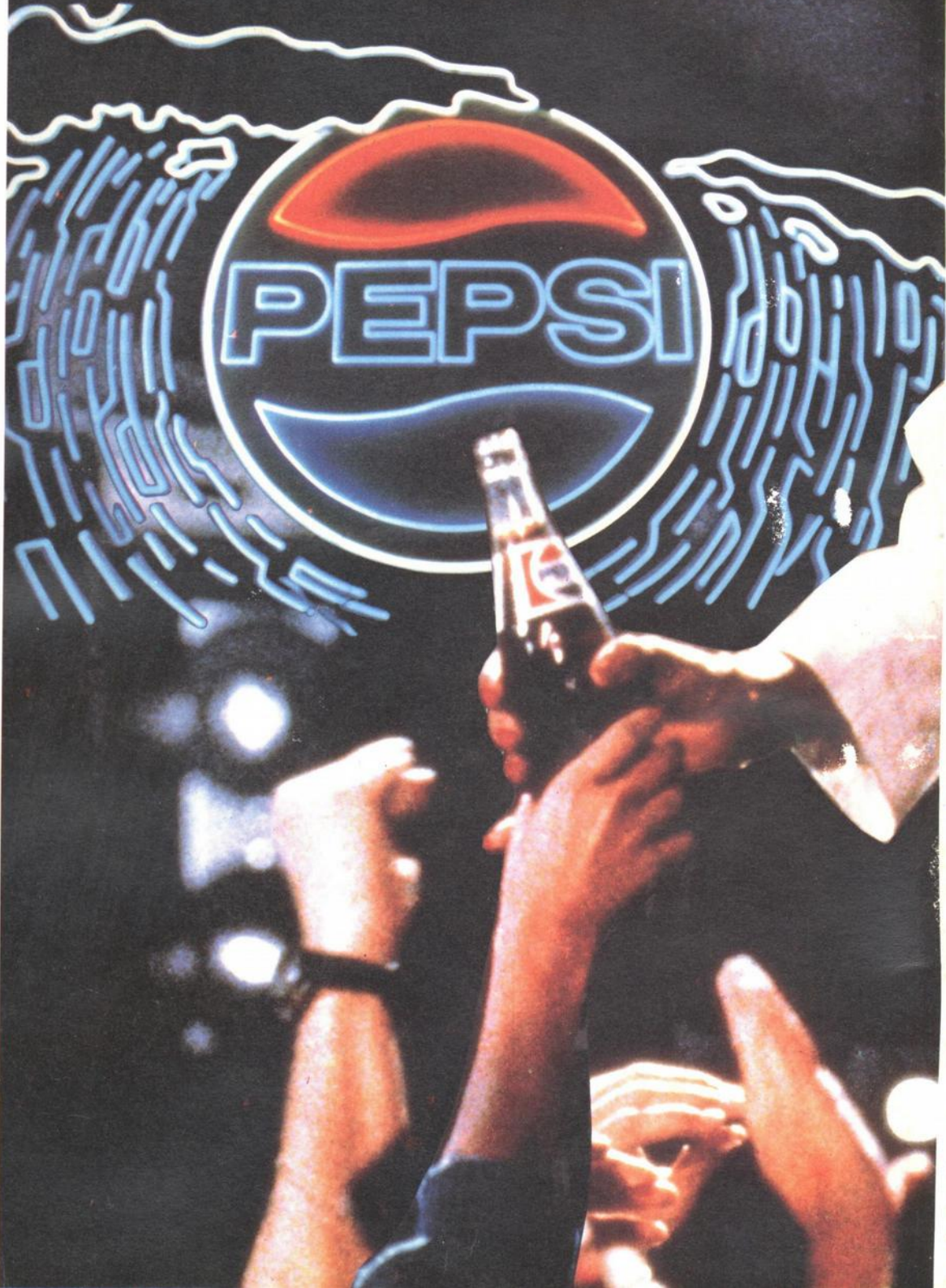

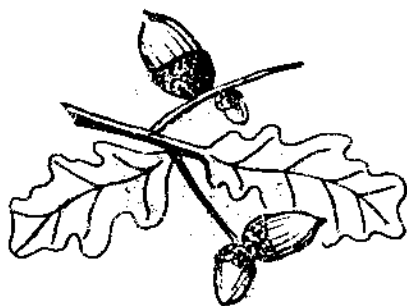
MIGHTY OAKS FROM LITTLE ACORNS GROW

It was on the 25th August 1974 that nine brave souls under G.M. John Brinsden ran on-out at Nanjing and thus Bandung Hash House Harriers were born. It was the third Hash in Indonesia (after Jakarta and Medan) and the first in Bandung.

BHHH went on to thrive and grow with a mixture of Expats and Indonesians until by 1983 they found themselves with regular attendances of three hundred plus.

The committee felt that this was too many people to enjoy either the run or the on-in. At first they closed the membership but still found people were clamouring to join. As most of the new interest was from Indonesians it was decided that the Indonesians would start their own Hash, and so, on the 30th April 1984, with the help and guidance of some Expats BHHH2, under G.M. Amir was formed. Now it became necessary to introduce the colloquial names of the two BHHH's, 'Hash 1' and 'Hash 2'. The two Hashes continued to prosper side by side with Hash 1 (Mondays) attracting around 25% Indonesian members and Hash 2 (Fridays) getting a dozen or more Expats most weeks. Inevitably, with the continual movement of Expats in and out, Hash 1 membership remained around the 200 mark. However, Hash 2 membership snowballed until by 1987 it claimed 700 members.

Now I've always thought that Hashers must have a screw loose to enjoy doing what we do but what happened next must prove that there are more screws loose in Bandung than anywhere else in the world. It can only be described as a Hashing explosion where in quick succession we had the formation of:



Libra	(Tuesday & Friday)	quickly up to	700 members
Pola	(Wednesday)	200	"
K'pella	(Friday)	400	"
Pelita	(Friday)	600	"
Family Run	(Alternate Sundays)	1000	"

This makes a total of 7 clubs with over 3500 members.

Apart from having fantastic hashing country I don't know what it is about Bandung in particular to cause this phenomenon. Just on sheer numbers Bandung must qualify as the hashing capital of the world but to sustain all these members takes a lot of work from a lot of committed individuals who are determined to put Bandung on the world hashing map.

Bandung has a pleasant climate and boasts some great hashing country with spectacular scenery, other attractions in and around Bandung are described elsewhere in this book.

We have the facilities and enthusiasm to host the Pan Asia Hash in 1991, and can assure all participants of a time to remember.

And so, in April 1984, the second Bandung Hash was organized and held its inaugural run with about 75 hashers. Hashing had definitely caught "on-on".

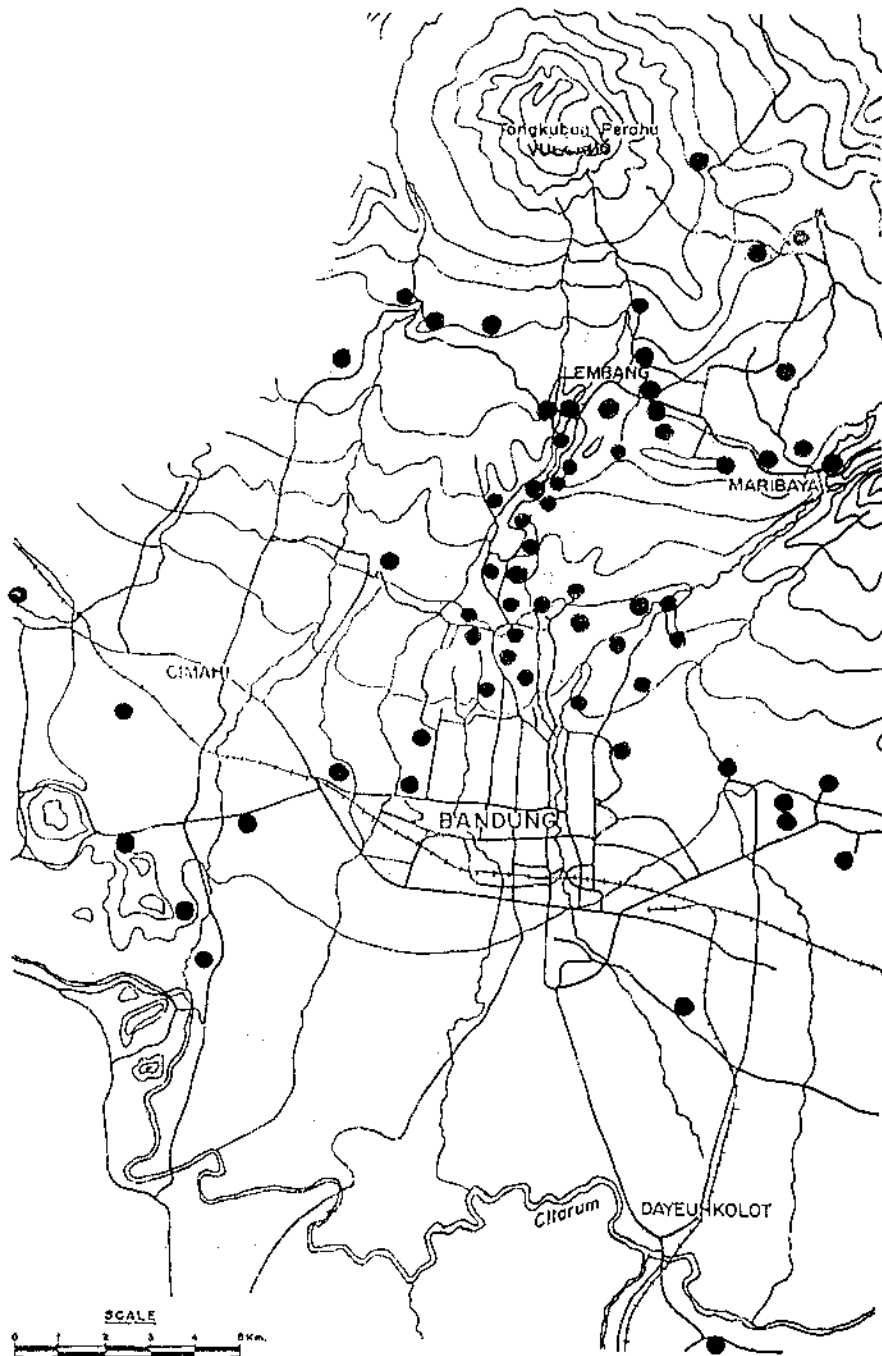

Bandung Overland

Jakarta-Bandung overland tour offers remarkable scenery of tea plantations, terraced rice fields and enchanting mountains. 60 km south of Jakarta is Bogor (45-minute drive via the Jagorawi Highway). The area lies 290 m above sea level, situated in open uplands at the foot of mountains. For many years Bogor has been a popular weekend and holiday resort famed for its wonderful botanical garden, palace, and zoological museum.

Bogor Botanical Garden, in the downtown area, covers 110 ha, contains 15,000 species of tropical plants from as far away as Latin America, Asia, and many parts of Indonesia, from towering trees of 50-m height to 5,000 hybrid orchids in a greenhouse. The observation of botany is facilitated with a botanical Library and the Bibliotheca Bogorriensis.

The Zoological Museum of Bogor inside the garden houses displays of life-like stuffed Indonesian fauna such as horn rhinoceros, komodo, Orang Utan and other animals, in addition to a 27-m long skeleton of a Blue Whale and a library with 120,000 volumes.

Joining the garden is the presidential palace, a big mansion with hundreds of deer roaming in the park. During the Dutch period, the palace was used by the governor general as a weekend retreat from Batavia (Jakarta). So it was dubbed 'Buitenzorg' or away from worries. Today, the palace houses an art collection including 219 paintings and 156 sculptures of artists from many countries including Indonesia. On to Puncak, a weekend resort on the slopes of Mount Gede, at an elevation of 1,200 m above sea level, the road climbs up through a green velvet landscape of tea plantations. Bungalow style hotels and restaurants flank the roadsides.

At Cibereum Village, before Puncak, lies the Safari Park (previously called African Lion Park). The park occupies 55 ha where wild animals from many parts of the world live freely. Visitor is allowed to enter only inside enclosed vehicles

After reaching the top, the road descends and before Cipanas, a right turn leads to Cibodas Botanical Garden. Cibodas, at 1,400 m on the slope of Mt. Pangrango and Gede, covers 80 ha, planted with varieties of flora. In the Dutch period of Indonesia, columnists wrote of it as the Asian Garden of Eden.

The travel to Bandung from Puncak takes 2 hours passing through Cianjur and Padalarang. Halfway between Cianjur and Padalarang, a right turn leads to Saguling Dam, which is now being developed to be a resort area.

Getting There

Bouraq, Merpati and Garuda operate frequent flight to Bandung from Jakarta, but it's so close and the mountain scenery is so spectacular that it seems a pity to fly. Most Indonesian take the bus or train. The Parahyangan Express takes just over three hours from Jakarta to Bandung and cost about US\$6 first class, US\$4.50 second class. There are four trains daily, leaving from Jakarta's Gambir Station at 5:30, 10:15, 15:15 and 18:45 respectively, with a similar return schedule.

The next quicker way is by shared inter-city taxi, a ride of four hours (generally in a huge Holden with five other people) costing about the same as the train but delivering you to your doorstep. The express bus is a bit slower, because of the stops, but cheaper, about US\$3.50 for an air-conditioned express, even less for local Bandung-bound buses which leave from Jakarta's Cilandak Terminal at the south of the city:



Bandung & Beyond

Bandung the capital of West Java, is a charming city 180 km southeast of Jakarta, reachable by road, rail and air. The area lies 768 m above sea level with the temperatures ranging from 20°C to 34°C, 70% average humidity and 1.864 mm annual rainfall.

The area covers 8.098 ha, to be extended to 17.000 ha and has a population of more than 1.75 million people.

Bandung was discovered in the 14th century as a part of the Hindu Kingdom of Pajajaran. In the Dutch period, the city was called 'Parijs van Java' or 'Paris from Java', and in 1955, the first Asian-African conference met here, bringing together the leaders of 29 Asian and African nations. Today, Bandung is known as the city of industry (textile and aircraft) and as an educational center with over 27 universities and colleges.

Since the end of the 60's, foreign visitors have flocked to Bandung, as it is located on the popular tourist route- originating in Jakarta, the entry point to Yogyakarta via Bandung, then on to Bali.

In the city, you can visit the Museum of Asia-Africa Conference, Museum of Geology famed with the only skull of *Pithecanthropus erectus* (pre-historic Java man), and mammoth skeleton 4-m high,

besides 3,400 geological items. Gedung Sate (near the museum) the West Java's governor office, Bandung Institute of Technology and other buildings which remain with the original old architecture.

Saung Angklung Ujo at Jalan Padasuka performs a native music produced by bamboo instruments, and a traditional art of puppet play, the 'Wayang Golek'. Yayasan Pusat Kebudayaan (Central Cultural Foundation) in the city center has Saturday evening performance of native dance in addition to weekly scheduled performanc of 'Wayang Golek'.

Uptown Bandung has Juanda Park with the World War II Japanese defense caves, Dago Golf, Karang Setra Swimming Pool, Babakan Siliwangi typical restaurant and Bumi Sangkuriang tennis court.

Dining

Tizi's is managed by the wife of a former Indonesian ambassador to Germany and has an open-air garden dining area, with German specialities and excellent breads and pastries. The Sukarasa is a more formal and expensive establishment with a French-style menu. Many westerners also patronize The Coffee Shop opposite the Kumala Panghegar Hotel on Jl. Asia Afrika.

The Braga Permai, in the middle of Jalan Braga is a popular sidewalk cafe serving ice-cream, pastries, yoghurt, sandwiches and rice dishes. And no visit to Bandung is complete without a visit to the Dago Teahouse for a lovely vista of the city.

Another of Bandung's treats is Babakan Siliwangi, an open-air Sundanese restaurant set amid acres of green rice paddies and large fish-ponds. Here are served all the traditional Sundanese delicacies; grilled carpe; barbeque chicken in sweet soya; fish with coconut and spices wrapped in banana leaves, and sour vegetable soup. Other good Sundanese restaurants are Bale Kambang and Ponyo.

The best-known Chinese restaurants are the *Queen*, the *Golden Palace International Restaurant*, the *Tjoen Kie* and *Trio Restaurant*.

Shopping

Bandung is a good place to buy baskets and mats (woven in nearby Tasikmalaya, an hour to the east past Garut on the Yogya highway), bambu

angklung instruments, *wayang golek* puppets and *american jeans*. High-quality ceramics (including many imitations of Chinese antiques) are produced in the nearby village of Plered and sold in Bandung. You can have good leather shoes made in many shoestores on *Cibaduyut* -- they will copy your favourite pair for a fraction of what you would pay at home. And the city also has many talented young artists.

The biggest souvenir shops are located on *Jalan Braga* -- there are also many book stores here.

If you are interested in ceramics, go over to the Balai Penelitian Keramik (Ceramic Research Office), Jalan A. Yani 390, in the morning, where you can observe the whole process and also purchase the finished products.

Hotels

There are dozens of hotels in Bandung which are generally of a high standard. Four or five stars hotels such as the Panghegar, Papandayan, Savoy Homann. Resort hotels located at Lembang, Maribaya/Ciater and Pangalengan.

Excursions Out of Bandung

A day trip to the north of Bandung offers Tangkuban Perahu Crater, Ciater and Maribaya hot spring resorts. A visit to the crater gives you an interesting volcano excursion in Java, since the road is passable even by bus up to the crater's rim. Looking over the rim, you see and smell the pungent sulphur beds of the crater. Here on the rim, coffee shop and souvenir stalls are available. From here you may climb up to the upper part of the rim to a geological station en route to Kawah Domas – another crater which sulphur is still actively erupting, then walk on a forest track through cool wooded slopes and out on the road 2 km down to the parking lot.

15-minutes drive from the crater is Ciater hot spring resort, a nice place to relax and enjoy the beauty of the land. The resort provides cottage-style hotels, restaurants, tennis courts and rich-mineral water pools which is good for skin medication and care.

On the way back to Bandung, visit Maribaya hot spring resort, 5 km beyond Lembang. The resort lies in between green valleys and it has a refreshing mountain breeze that maintains the temperature between 10° and 19°C, and it is considerably cooler at night. A path through gardens leads you to a bridge over a thundering waterfall dropping some 25 meters. When you feel adventurous, you may walk from Maribaya through thick forests on the hills full of pine and quinine trees to Juan's observation park in uptown Bandung.

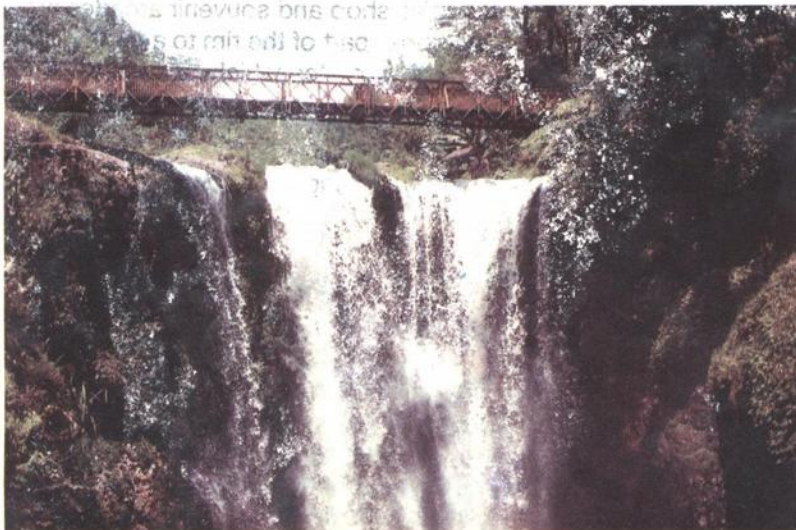
Tour to the South of Bandung

A day tour to the south of Bandung offers quiet and relaxing places. Patengan has a natural lake, situated among tea plantations and forest covered slopes. The eastern part of the lake is bounded by a cool forest which is often foggy all day long with the temperature below 10°C.

Pangalengan, at 1,450 m above sea level, has another lake situated on the fertile plateau, 40 km southeast of Bandung. This large bowl in the mountains is completely surrounded by forested volcanic parks. Pangalengan has important chinchona estates and is known for cool mountain climate and beautiful landscapes.

From Bandung to the East

an-hour's drive to the east, a side road detours to Garut before the direct route in Tasikmalaya. Garut is a small town, lies in cool highlands circled by mountains. The hot spring resort of Cipanas offers hot water swimming pools.

GENERAL INFORMATION

ENTRY FORMALITIES

All visitors to Indonesia must have valid passports. Citizens of countries with which Indonesia has diplomatic relations, who are staying in the country for not more than 60 days, do not need a visa provided they have tickets for their onward or return journeys.

Visas may be obtained from Indonesia diplomatic and consular offices abroad.

HEALTH

Yellow fever vaccination is required upon arrival of visitors from infected areas, Africa and South America.

CUSTOMS

Tourists may bring in the following items free of duty:

1. Personal effects: a reasonable amount of clothing for personal use a small quantity of perfume.
2. Tobacco and alcoholic beverages: 400 cigarettes, two bottles of alcoholic beverages of not more than one liter each. Departures involve an airport tax Rp. 10.000 (approx. US\$ 7.00)

CLIMATE

Bandung has two seasons: the dry months from May to October and the rainy months from November to April.

During June-July months, temperature average 22 days - 18°C.

WHAT TO WEAR

Light, casual clothes are recommended, but pack a jacket or windbreaker for on in and visits to cool mountain runs in Lembang and other regions.

CURRENCY FACTS

The monetary unit is the Rupiah. Paper notes are in denominations of Rp. 10.000, Rp. 5.000, Rp. 1.000, Rp. 500. Coins come in one, five, 10, 25 and 50 rupiah denominations. The exchange rate is 1 US\$ - Rp. 1.756. Money can be changed at the airport, in banks and all hotels.

TIPPING

Tipping is an accepted practice, with 10% of the total amount being standard. However, most hotels and large restaurants automatically add on a 10% service charge, in which case additional tips are optional. Rp. 500 is sufficient for bellboys or porters, depending on the amount of your baggage. Taxi drivers are usually tipped.

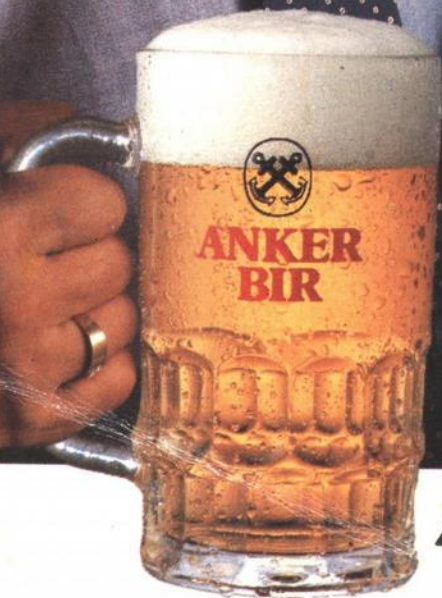
